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### Mission Statement

The mission of the Kent County Office of Community Corrections is to: support and expand the use of community sanctions in order to provide rehabilitation opportunities for Kent County offenders, promote the efficient use of jail/prison beds while protecting public safety, and examine the causes of repeated criminal behavior while facilitating collaboration among stakeholders and service providers.

This handbook is intended as a guide for judges and other court officials in selecting programs and services as alternatives to incarceration for felony offenders. In it you will find information on Office of Community Corrections (OCC) eligibility criteria, program descriptions, and contact information.

A section on programs and services provided at the Kent County Correctional Facility (KCCF) is also included in this handbook. Although most of the programs at KCCF are not funded by Kent County Office of Community Corrections (KCOCC), one goal of KCOCC is to reduce prison and jail commitments and this can be accomplished by referring eligible offenders into rehabilitative programming offered through KCCF.

## **OVERVIEW**

The Kent County Office of Community Corrections (KCOCC) seeks to reduce state prison commitments and prevent overcrowding at the Kent County Correctional Facility (KCCF) by diverting low risk, non-violent felony offenders into rehabilitative programming. KCOCC advocates the use of sentencing options that include jail time combined with a term of probation and rehabilitative programming rather than a prison and/or straight jail disposition. Funded by grant monies obtained from the Michigan Department of Corrections, KCOCC provides funding for rehabilitative programming that will instill offenders with the knowledge, skills, and abilities to change the behavior that lead to their involvement in the criminal justice system along with breaking the cycle of crime and reduce future criminal activity.

A variety of programming options are funded by KCOCC including community service, substance abuse treatment, intensive supervision, education and employment, pretrial supervision, and mental health counseling. Some of the programs focus more on rehabilitating an offender's addictive or criminal personality while other programs are utilized to more closely monitor an offender's behavior.

KCOCC also provides funding for probation residential centers (PRC) which provide an intensive level of community supervision for non-violent higher-risk offenders who would likely receive long-term jail or prison dispositions. These centers provide a structured sentencing alternative that frees up jail and prison space for more serious offenders in addition to allowing an offender to receive rehabilitative services.

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## **P.A. 511 OVERVIEW**

### **Public Act 511**

P.A. 511, also known as the Community Corrections Act, was established in 1988 to provide funds to local governments to develop community corrections programs. The purpose is to increase the range of sanctions and services available for non-violent felony offenders who would otherwise be incarcerated in state prisons and local jails.

### **How the Act works**

Funding for community corrections programs is provided through grants awarded by the State Board to the local governments. In order to apply to the State Board for funding, local boards must have completed a Comprehensive Corrections Plan, which is the basis for the funding requests. Programs seeking funding must meet the criteria established by the local boards to reduce or curb commitments to state prisons and to increase the appropriate use of local jails.

### **Purpose of the Act**

The purpose of the Community Corrections Act is to:

- Reduce prison admissions
- Better utilize available space at the Kent County Correctional Facility
- Improve treatment programming for offenders in order to reduce recidivism
- Protect the public
- Increase restitution to victims of crime

## **P.A. 511 ELIGIBILITY GUIDELINES**

### **Specific Sentencing Guideline Eligibility Criteria**

- The SGL score must be **0 – 9** or greater.
- Probation violators with an SGL score of **0 – 6** or greater on the original offense.
- Pretrial defendants that are referred to OCC programming must have an Objective Points Scale (OPS) score of 3, or be on Circuit Court Probation.
- Offenses that have no SGL score contact KCOCC office for eligibility requirements.

### **Basic Offender Eligibility Guidelines**

- Offenders must be convicted of a non-violent felony crime in the County of Kent and/or State of Michigan.
- Offenders are not eligible if criminal history includes 2 or more violent or assaultive felony convictions within 5 years of the instant offense.
- Enrollment should be in lieu of an incarcerative sentence or as a reduction to an incarcerative sentence.
- Offender must be supervised by Pretrial Services or be on Circuit Court probation during their enrollment in the P.A. 511 funding program.
- Offenders who have served the entire prison or jail sentence are not eligible for enrollment into a P.A. 511 funded program unless enrollment is due to an official probation/parole violation.
- Offenders enrolled with a probation violation must have been formally violated (i.e. an Amended Probation Order signed by the judge must be completed and available upon request).
- Offenders enrolled with a parole violation must have been formally charged and the Violation Charge and Waiver of Hearing sheets must be submitted with the offender enrollment form.
- Offense must have a statutory maximum of at least 24 months or greater. In addition, the offender must have at least one (1) prior felony conviction in addition to the instant offense OR a probation violation on the current offense.

Risk/needs assessments are performed on pretrial defendants and sentenced male and female felony offenders to assist probation officers, pretrial case workers and OCC funded agencies in making referral and treatment decisions.

*Target Population:*

- Pretrial defendants with an OPS score of 2 or 3
- Male and female felony offenders who were not assessed at the pretrial phase with an SGL score of 0 – 9 or higher can be assessed at the presentence phase
- Offenders on probation that meet OCC guidelines
- Probation violators

*Key Elements of the Assessment:*

- Identifies needs and strengths of an offender
- Assists with placement of offenders into programming
- Assists with treatment planning for the offender
- Assists with determining risks of the offender

Network 180 staff will be providing a level of care screening for referred male and female felony offenders who have been identified and/or suspected of substance abuse disorders. The screenings will assist the probation officers in determining the level of substance abuse treatment the offender should receive.

#### *Target Population:*

- OCC eligible felony offenders with suspected substance abuse issues
- Probation violators

#### *Services Provided:*

- Telephone assessment completed for most offenders
- Assessment completed at the jail if the offender is still incarcerated
- Face to face assessment can be arranged if an offender does not have a telephone
- Assessment will screen for co-occurring mental health disorders as well as substance abuse
- Assessment will help identify whether or not an offender needs to be in treatment

The Community Service program provides screening, assessment, placement and monitoring of sentenced male and female offenders sentenced to perform a specified number of work hours with non-profit organizations throughout the county.

#### *Target Population:*

- Sentenced male and female felony offenders
- Probation violators

#### *Services Provided:*

- Initial screening by case worker to determine most appropriate placement for completing required service hours
- Referral to work site
- Regular updates with work site to monitor progress of offender in completing hours
- Notification to referring probation agent or court of successful or unsuccessful completion

*Cost to Offender:* None

## **COMMUNITY SERVICE**

The Work Crew program provides screening, assessment, placement and monitoring of sentenced male and female felony offenders who are ordered by the 17<sup>th</sup> Circuit Court to complete a specific number of work crew hours. The work is labor intensive and performed in a group setting under close supervision and therefore considered a more serious sentence than community service.

#### *Target Population:*

- Sentenced male and female felony offenders
- Probation violators

#### *Services Provided:*

- Initial screening by case worker to determine work crew schedule placement for completing required service hours
- Referral to work crew
- Regular updates with Work Crew Supervisor to monitor progress of offender in completing hours
- Notification to referring probation agent or court of successful or unsuccessful completion

The OUIL III CBT treatment program provides assessment, case management, inpatient, and outpatient services for eligible OUIL III male & female offenders who are targeted by the state as “prison bound”.

#### *Target Population:*

- OUIL III offenders with a lockout SGL score
- Probation violators

#### *Eligibility Criteria:*

- Offender must be alcohol or drug dependant for at least one month or showing a pattern of abuse for at least six months
- Offender must demonstrate a commitment to change
- Offender must be sober and not experiencing withdrawal symptoms

#### *Services Provided:*

- An assessment is completed to determine a treatment plan
- If recommended in the assessment, the offender will be moved to Pine Rest’s residential treatment center
- A specialized treatment group is provided at three locations: the residential treatment center, the Reentry Center at the jail and at the Pine Rest outpatient center

The Sobriety Court Program provides assessment, case management, drug testing and individualized treatment programming to assist eligible male and female OUIL III offenders in overcoming his/her addiction to alcohol. The offender is also required to meet frequently with the Sobriety Court Judge to assess their progress and to impose sanctions for any violations. This is a 12 – 18 month program consisting of four phases, which the offender must progress through at his/her own pace. Sobriety Court is designed for offenders who need a structured intensive program and have a willingness to receive treatment for their addiction in order to avoid a lengthy jail sentence.

#### *Target Population:*

- Pretrial defendants
- OUIL III offenders who have a lockout SGL score and have been assessed as alcohol dependent
- Probation violators

#### *Additional Eligibility Criteria:*

- Priority is given to male and female offenders who either reside in the City of Grand Rapids or committed their offense within the city limits. Offenders living in Kent County outside of the city limits of Grand Rapids can also be referred to the program
- Offenders with a willingness to admit responsibility and plead guilty to the offense
- Offenders with an identifiable substance abuse problem
- Offenders with no more than three prior felony convictions and no violent felony offenses

This program provides cognitive behavioral treatment to male felony offenders enrolled in the Alternative Directions Probation Residential Program to aid them in changing their thinking and decision making processes and assist them in developing appropriate life choices to avoid future criminal activity. The services provided by the Alternative Directions Noncore program are not provided or paid for by the regular Alternative Directions Probation Residential Service program.

- Pretrial defendants

- CBT (cognitive behavioral therapy)

GRCC provides GED preparation and testing through the Learning Corner @ Wealthy. Offenders enrolled in this program will receive a comprehensive assessment during intake which will establish an offender's level of ability in math, reading, science, social studies, and writing. This assessment will assist in the placement of the offender in the right GED prep program offered by the Learning Corner. Career counseling and an Educational Development Plan will also be available with any GED tests taken by enrolled offenders being free of cost to the offender

Alternative Directions provides a day reporting program which assists the Probation Department in more closely supervising probationers without having to house the offender in residential programming. In addition to closer supervision within the community, an offender can be referred to the Day Reporting Center to assist with employment-related issues, cognitive-behavioral treatment, drug and alcohol testing, and GED preparation classes.

#### *Target Population:*

Intensive supervision programming is for eligible male or female offenders that are either pretrial, sentenced or probation violators. The DRC program is a highly structured, non residential intermediate sanction that provides services and intervention programs that require strict accountability requirements through scheduling, monitoring of daily activities, and incorporating services based on each offenders needs.

#### *Target Population:*

- Pretrial defendants
- Felony offenders
- Probation violators

#### *Services Provided*

- Initial assessment to determine treatment plan
- Three levels of programming are required for offender to progress through treatment
- Four critical elements of addressing risks & needs of the offender: offender accountability, employment retention, substance use monitoring and treatment, and cognitive restructuring

The Anger Management Program provides a cognitive behavioral treatment (CBT) based group counseling to male and female offenders with anger management problems. The program helps the offender identify anger management issues and learn anger management skills and alternatives to anger.

#### *Target Population:*

- Pretrial defendants
- Male and female felony offenders
- Probation violators

#### *Services Provided:*

- Screening to determine appropriateness of referral
- Ten (10) one-hour group counseling sessions

#### *Program Goals:*

- Teach offenders to define anger, aggression and hostility
- Teach offenders to identify triggers and cues for their anger
- Teach offenders anger management techniques

This 52 week psycho-educational treatment program is open to male and female felony offenders with convictions for non-violent and non-predatory sex offenses. The goal of the program is to take offenders who have committed the qualified sex offenses and provide a therapeutic environment to help them grow emotionally, relationally, cognitively, behaviorally and spiritually, and gain the necessary skills to no longer be a threat to society and consequently create “no more victims”.

#### *Target Population:*

- Pretrial defendants
- Male and female felony offenders with a CSC 2<sup>nd</sup> or 4<sup>th</sup> offense
- Probation violators

#### *Services Provided:*

- Assessment to determine program eligibility and treatment plan
- Weekly treatment, including alternating group therapy and accountability sessions lasting 1.5 hours in length. Additionally, periodic individual sessions and medical reviews are conducted as needed for medication assessment, along with pre-post test discharge to measure program effectiveness
- Referrals to other programs, such as more intense specialized treatment, alcohol treatment or sex addiction, when needed

- Stopping offenses

Regular Pretrial Supervision provides assessment, referral and monitoring services, including drug testing, for male and female pretrial defendants who are released from the Kent County Correctional Facility on a conditional bond. Defendants may be referred for programming, including substance abuse as well as other needed services.

#### *Target Population:*

- Defendants released on bond with condition that they remain under supervision of Court Services until final disposition of their case
- Defendants with a previous pattern of non-compliance and failure to appear for court
- Defendants needing substance abuse assessment, monitoring or treatment
- Defendants requiring monitoring and supervision due to a history of mental health issues
- Defendants with a problematic or unstable place of residence

#### *Services Provided:*

- Referral for substance abuse, mental health, or educational services to appropriate community agencies
- Random drug and alcohol testing
- Weekly/biweekly meetings with defendants to monitor bond conditions, residence and provide notification of upcoming court dates
- Attendance at court proceedings to answer the judge's questions concerning defendant's progress or problems
- Provide information to the probation department, judges, and other court officials concerning the defendant's compliance and progress while under pretrial supervision

Maximum Pretrial Supervision provides the same type of services as the Regular Pretrial Supervision Program but does so under more intense supervision. Pretrial defendants under maximum pretrial supervision are required to wear an electronic device which provides 24 hour monitoring of these defendants. The defendant will meet with their case worker several times a week in either telephone or face-to-face meetings.

#### *Target Population:*

The same population as for regular pretrial services with the following exceptions:

- Defendants posing a greater risk of non-compliance and therefore needing more intense continuous supervision
- Defendants with an approved residence and telephone
- Defendants who agree to participate and sign the Pretrial Release Maximum Supervision Agreement

#### *Services Provided:*

- 24 hour daily electronic monitoring of defendant's location
- Face-to-face and telephone meetings with caseworker several times per week
- Referral for substance abuse, mental health, or educational services to appropriate community agencies
- Random drug and alcohol testing
- Attendance at court proceedings to answer the judge's questions concerning defendant's progress or problems
- Provide information to the probation department, judges, and other court officials concerning the defendant's compliance and progress while under maximum pretrial supervision

*Cost to Offender:* Based on cost of device used

Adult female non-violent felony offenders and probation violators in need of substance (drug or alcohol) abuse treatment are served by the Pine Rest Women's Residential Program. This is a three phase program that uses Cognitive Behavioral Treatment curriculum and allows the offender to reside in the facility but begin to work in the community during the third phase.

#### *Target Population:*

- Sentenced female felony offenders
- Probation violators

#### *Eligibility Criteria:*

- Offender must be alcohol or drug dependant for at least one month or showing a pattern of abuse for at least six months
- Offender must demonstrate a commitment to change
- Offender must be sober and not experiencing withdrawal symptoms

AOS provides outpatient drug and/or alcohol abuse treatment and interventions in a group setting to male and female felony offenders. The goals of treatment include increasing the individual's level of knowledge of relapse and recidivism and restructuring the individual's cognitive and behavioral patterns.

#### *Target Population:*

- Pretrial defendants
- Male and female felony offenders
- Probation violators

#### *Additional Eligibility Criteria:*

- Offender must be exhibiting drug and/or alcohol abuse issues
- Offender may be referred due to a substance use criminal offense (i.e. OUIL III, possession of controlled substance)
- Offender must be 17 years or older
- Offender must be physically and emotionally capable of participating in the treatment program

#### *Services Provided:*

- One initial assessment to evaluate the offender's severity of symptoms and the appropriate level of care
- A psycho-educational group is designed for individuals who do not yet recognize their substance abuse problem or who are unwilling to fully engage in treatment
- A therapy group is designed for individuals who are motivated for treatment and will benefit from being with others who are also ready for change and can provide positive support
- Treatment groups are 1.5 hour sessions and meet for 12 weeks

This program provides assessment and Cognitive Behavioral Treatment (CBT) to address both the criminality and the substance abuse dependency of the sentenced male and female felony offender. Services include individual, group, and intensive outpatient substance abuse treatment.

#### *Target Population:*

- Sentenced male and female felony offenders
- Probation violators

#### *Additional Eligibility Criteria:*

- Offender must be alcohol or drug dependant for at least one month or showing a pattern of abuse for at least six months
- Offender must demonstrate a commitment to change
- Offender must be sober and not experiencing withdrawal symptoms
- Offender must be physically and emotionally capable of participating in the treatment program
- Offender must be 17 years or older

## **THE KENT COUNTY CORRECTIONAL FACILITY**

### **Main Jail**

The main jail houses the vast majority of inmates sentenced to local incarceration. The main goal is to provide a secure correctional facility ensuring the safety and well being of the inmates, staff, and general public. While serving out a sentence at the KCCF, many inmates have the opportunity to participate in programming focusing on such areas as substance abuse, education, and mental illness.

### **Jail Programs**

#### **Alcoholics and Narcotics Anonymous**

AA and NA are voluntary programs for men and women to share and lend support in their struggles with alcohol or narcotics and assist each other in achieving and maintaining sobriety. All interested inmates are eligible to participate excluding those on disciplinary or other restrictions.

#### **Biblical Life Principles Pod**

The Biblical Life Principles Pod houses a maximum of 53 men who voluntary choose to focus on practical application of biblical principles in everyday life. Educational material includes: basic life principles, anger resolution, parenting and marital relations, self-confrontation, and heroes of faith.

### **Forgotten Man Ministries**

Forgotten Man Ministries provides counseling and coordinates all religious services and Bible studies for inmates at the KCCF. All KCCF inmates are eligible to participate in church services and have access to Bibles or other religious materials.

### **Grand Rapids Public Schools**

GRPS provides education opportunities, including GED preparation and completion classes, to men and women under the age of 20. Funding is no longer available for adult education.

### **Jail Diversion Mental Health Program**

The Jail Diversion Program seeks to divert mentally ill inmates, who have committed a misdemeanor or non-violent felony, from jail and provide them with treatment out in the community. Diversion can be done pre-booking, to allow the offender to avoid all contact with the Correctional Facility, or post-booking, to reduce the offender's term of incarceration.

Services for the mentally ill offender include psychiatric assessment, treatment, and case management. The Diversion case manager will meet with the offender to ensure that court dates are kept, fines are paid, and treatment is occurring including community skills development.

### **Literacy Council of West Michigan**

Volunteers from the Literacy Council of West Michigan work with any inmate who has less than a high school diploma or GED and *expect* to be in jail for 3 months or more.

### **Jail Mental Health Services (JMHS)**

This program provides a variety of mental health services to Kent County Correctional Facility inmate population 24

hours a day 7 days a week. Services include assessment, treatment/therapy, case management, psychiatric medication and psychiatric hospitalization (as appropriate).

### **Planned Parenthood**

Planned Parenthood provides education in group settings related to human sexuality, reproduction, birth control and STD's/HIV for both men and women. Anonymous HIV testing and counseling is also provided.

Men – 4 groups per month

Women – 2 groups per month

### **Sober Living Unit for Men** - provided by Arbor Circle

The SLU for Men is a voluntary 90 day intensive substance abuse treatment program providing group therapy. A maximum of 24 men, living separate from the general jail population, may participate in this program at one time.

### **SWAPP** (Social Work and Police Partnership)

SWAPP is a grant funded program that operates out of the Grand Rapids Police Department and targets female prostitutes and drug users. Weekly group meetings at both the jail and the Community Reentry Center assist the women in making life changes and staying off the streets.

The Kent County Community Reentry Center has beds for a total of 248 male and female offenders. The goal of the CRC is to transition low risk offenders following incarceration back into the community to be productive citizens and reduce the likelihood of recidivism. They offer programs and classes designed to provide offenders with thought provoking messages and encouragement. They aim to teach accountability, responsibility, and daily life skills. A full-time staff member assesses the needs of new residents to the CRC and provides referrals to programs and/or providers best suited to meet their needs.

### **CRC Programming**

The Kent County Community Reentry Center currently offers 32 different programs that residents can participate in during their stay. These programs are grouped based upon the type of service they provide to residents:

#### **Substance Abuse Treatment**

Substance abuse treatment services are provided through the following programs: Alcoholics Anonymous, Narcotics Anonymous, Sober Living Unit for Women, and the OUIL 3<sup>rd</sup> Offender Group.

#### **Vocational/Educational Programs**

Residents can obtain vocational/educational programs through the following programs: GED Class, Michigan Works!, Help Your Child Become a Better Reader, Goodwill Industries Work Program, and Sex/Health Education.

#### **Spirituality-based Programming**

Spirituality-based programming is delivered through a number of different programs with several of the programs geared directly to men or women: Conquers Strength Team, Forgotten Man Ministries, Spiritual Talk for Women, House of Prayer for Women, Living Water Ministries/Supported Permanent Housing and Workshops for Women, New Life for Women, United Methodist Community House/First Step House for Women, Take Charge for Women, Sister Talk for Women, Men-N-Motion for Men, and Women's Bible Ministry.

#### **Parenting and Relationship Programs**

Residents of the Community Reentry Center can also participate in programming that is geared towards parenting and relationship issues: Proud Fathers, Proud Parents, Mom's in Touch, Family Wellness, and How to Avoid Marrying A Jerk.

#### **Life Skills Programs**

The Community Reentry Center offers programming that assists residents in developing a number of life skills necessary to lead productive, crime-free lives: Preparing for a Better Life Initiative, Nurturing a New Start for Women, and SWAPP for Women (geared towards women incarcerated for prostitution).

#### **Other Programs**

A number of other programming options are also offered residents assigned to the Community Reentry Center: Animal Friends, On-Site Work Crews, Off-Site Work Crews, and Art Class.

The Honor Camp is used as a work camp primarily for minimal custody non-violent youthful offenders. Male inmates between the ages of 17 to 24 who are sentenced to jail are eligible for Honor Camp. A structured living environment consisting of school programs and labor intensive work provides an alternative to the usual jail environment.
